Edgar Gale was one of six children who was born in Hunslet, Leeds in 1880. He married Clarice Burton in Thorner church in 1904 when he was aged 23 and the 1911 census records him as living in Headingly with Clarice, Nancie aged four and twin sons, Thomas and Arthur aged two. He had followed in his father's footsteps and was working as an estate agent. His family moved into Towerhurst when he returned from brief service in the army in 1918. Shipping lists and war grave records allow us to follow the young twins. Arthur died at Dunkirk in WW2 and Thomas emigrated to Australia after the war. Edgar was living in Roundhay in 1952 when he died at the age of 72.

Herbert Hargreaves grew up in Rothwell near Leeds and attended medical college before marrying Elsie Pater, in 1910. By 1911 Herbert was working in general medical practise in Wetherby from a surgery at Wetherby House in Market Place which he shared with his brother James.

Arthur Stokes was born in London in 1886, son of a Butcher's Clerk. He married Gwendolen in Somerset in 1907 before moving to Collingham in 1912 with their two year old son, Alan Henry. Arthur worked as a clerk for the Inland Revenue, leaving Holmdene in 1915. Later Arthur moved to St Albans to live near Alan. Sadly, Alan died in 1961 aged fifty one, with Arthur living for another year until his death in St Albans in 1962

Rathleague, now Willow Green Alfred John Knowles was born in Holbeck, Leeds in 1869. In 1893 he married Elizabeth Harrison at Oxford Place Chapel, Leeds. Their daughter, Constance May, was born the same year. By 1911 the family had moved to Collingham with Alfred employed in the wholesale grocery business. Following Alfred's death in 1918, Elizabeth moved to Scarborough where she died in 1967

George Dawson, carpet salesman, and wife Annie, moved from Cleckheaton to bring up their four children in Collingham. Before enlisting in the army Donald, the middle son, worked as a farmer. The younger children, Doris and

The younger children, **Doris** and **Joseph** were at school and the family had a servant, **Lena Fletcher** who was aged sixteen lived with them. Donald served as a gunner in the Royal Garrison Artillery but it is not known where he served. In 1916 he married **Ida Smith** in Wetherby in 1916 and

returned after the war when their two children were born. Donald

died in Goole in 1965.

George E Dawson, the eldest son, grew up with his siblings in Fair View. Before the war he was working as a millinery salesman. George married Hilda Stoker at St Oswald's church and had a son in 1916 shortly before leaving to fight in France. George died from injuries in November 1917 and is buried in the Nine Elms British Cemetery in France.

Joseph Cornock grew up in Brighton, the oldest of six siblings. His younger brother, Arthur was killed at Vimy Ridge in 1917. Joseph married Elizabeth Smith in 1901 in Leeds. Their son Arthur was born in 1902, followed by Edward in 1904. The family had moved to Collingham by 1909 with Joseph working as an engineer. Joseph and Elizabeth continued to live there until his death in 1931. Edward emigrated to USA, dying in 1968. Arthur died in 1983.

George Waddington and his siblings, Charles and Doris were born in Bradford and grew up with their father Charles, a chemist and mother, Mary. Their father died in 1907 and Doris and the three adult children moved to Collingham, together with five year old Barbara. They lived with their grandmother in the house now known as 10 The Avenue. George enlisted in 1914 rising to the rank of major and being awarded the Military Cross in the New Year's Honours list in 1919. George returned to The Avenue where he died in 1940.

Charles Waddington was born in Bradford in 1885. He was educated at Bradford Grammar School and Leeds University from where he graduated from Medical School in 1914. Charles was commissioned in the Royal Army Medical Corps in 1914. In 1915 he was posted to Malta and worked at the Military Hospital in Floriana where he contracted amoebic dysentery. This continued to cause problems until his medical discharge in 1919. Charles married Dorothy Dunn in 1925 at St James' Wetherby, where her father was vicar. Charles died in Wetherby in 1936.



Cherisy

John Edgar Herridge was born in Caister, Norfolk to parents who were both school teachers. By the time John was aged seven, he and his brother Alfred, had moved with the family, first to Knaresborough and then to Bardsey where his parents lived for the rest of their lives. At the age of seventeen John was apprenticed to a wood engraver in Bardsey. In 1908 John married Lillian Twidale in St Oswald's church and moved to The Bungalow where their son, Norman was born in 1912. Lillian died in 1949 and John was buried in All Hallow's churchvard. Bardsey, following his death in 1959.

George Colbeck Welch was born in London in 1884 the son of tailor Charles Welch and mother, Florence. George's father died when he was only four years old. In 1890 Florence married **Edward Colbeck** and George grew up in Leeds with his sister and 3 half-siblings. George was working as a commercial traveller when he married Edith Mitchell in St Oswald's church in 1913. The couple were living at 'Cherisy', on the site of 'Red Gables', when he left to fight in WW1. George served in France and was awarded the Military Cross. After the war George returned to raise his sons, Edward and James, in Cherisy. George became Vice President of Collingham Royal British Legion and was the Platoon Commander of the local Home Guard in WW2. He continued to live in the Avenue until his death in 1943.
